Appearing as "territories", these built structures accommodate various needbased functions ranging from institutional to commercial and catering to a diverse set of users. At the same time, however, they are defeating the very purpose of the public spaces they inhabit, which is to serve as arenas for communal sociability and recreation. The thesis aims to address this spatial paradox in one of the most densely populated areas of the city, i.e., Lyari. The intent is not to erase territories from the public realm, but to rethink their architectural characteristics in ways that they do not erase the social value of public spaces.
