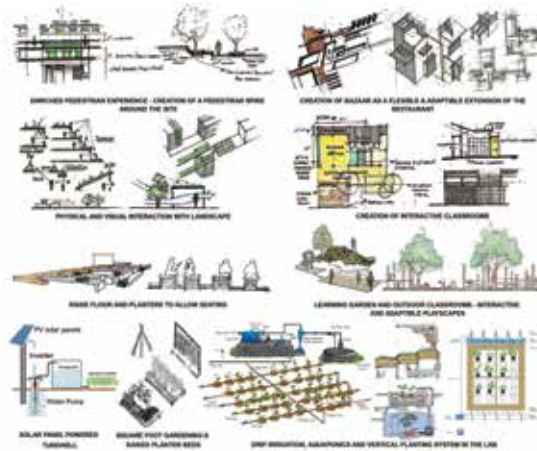




Ayesha Channa

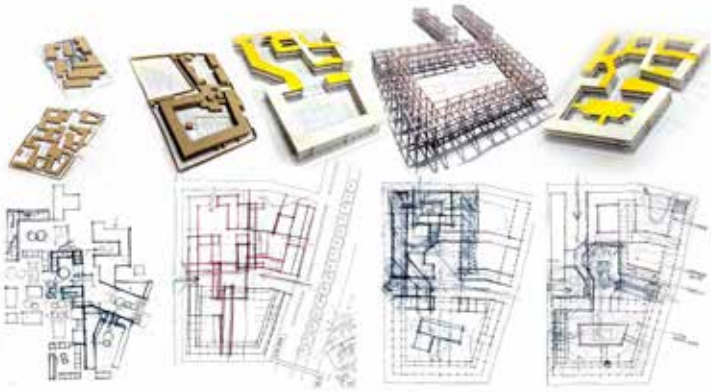


Faheem Abrar

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Redefining Edhi Home (Sohrab Goth)

At the current Edhi Sohrab Goth facility, growth thus far is not a planned one; it grows in an unplanned way bleeding out to spaces available for expansion leading to clashing functions and a sense of confusion. This thesis intends to architecturally redefine the existing facility and tie up these spaces by manipulating the existing architectural elements that the facility employs. The thesis aims to create spaces that encourage physical interaction to promote healing. A major consideration in this thesis is to keep the interventions as economical as possible since Edhi is a charity-run organization.





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Panah-e-Saalik

Street children are invisible part of the society. The intention was to generate an architecture language and program to which the user can built a sense of belonging. Two basic modes of living were taken as precedence for this thesis; cave and nest. Within the cave the body needs adapt to the space to meet its needs. As the body adapts, the space takes on a new subjective and temporal definition. A harmonious relationship is established between the body and space. Whereas a nest implies a space that has been specifically prepared for habitation. The state of 'cave' satisfies the user while 'nest' satisfies few functions. So the design philosophy is based on transition from cave to nest.

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Community Mental Healthcare Center

I am looking at how healing can be an architectural factor for the recovery of mental health patients especially in depression. The therapies for mental health are changing worldwide, unfortunately here we do not have an approach to recovery of mind from a perspective which is activity oriented. Therapies today happen at the interface of public and the private, in a sense my architecture is about designing those thresholds that are essential for the recovery of mental health and deviates from isolation and encourages integration. An urban oasis for the people in stress within our urban fabric. 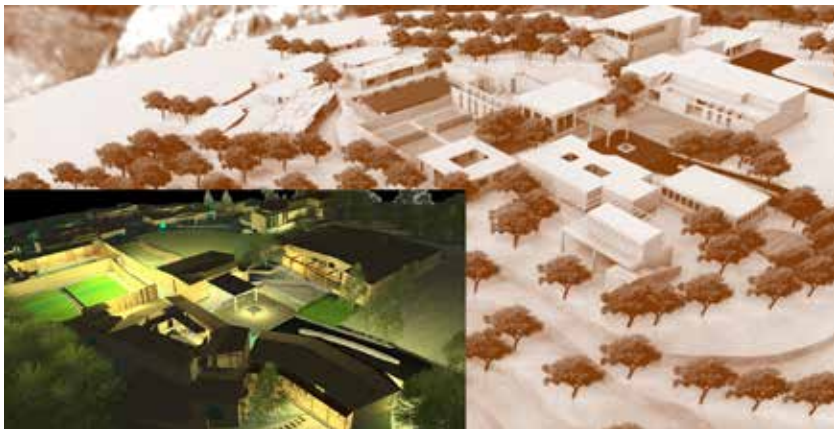


Jahangir Ahmed Chohan

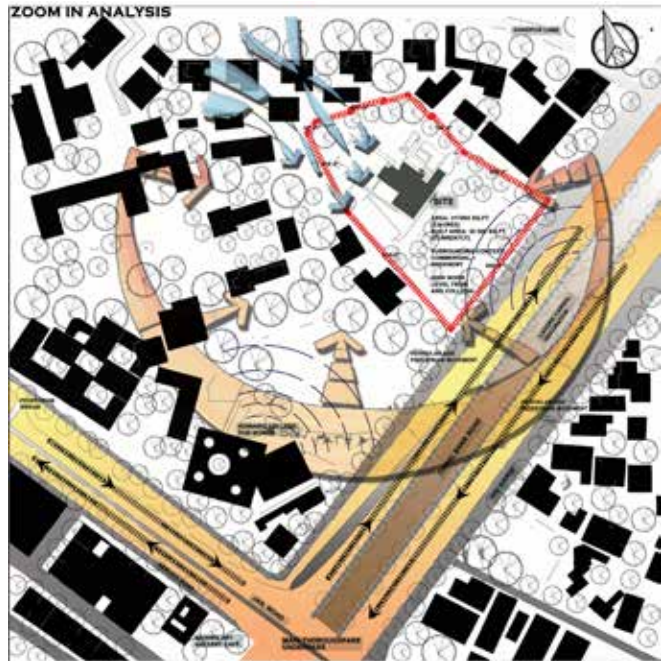

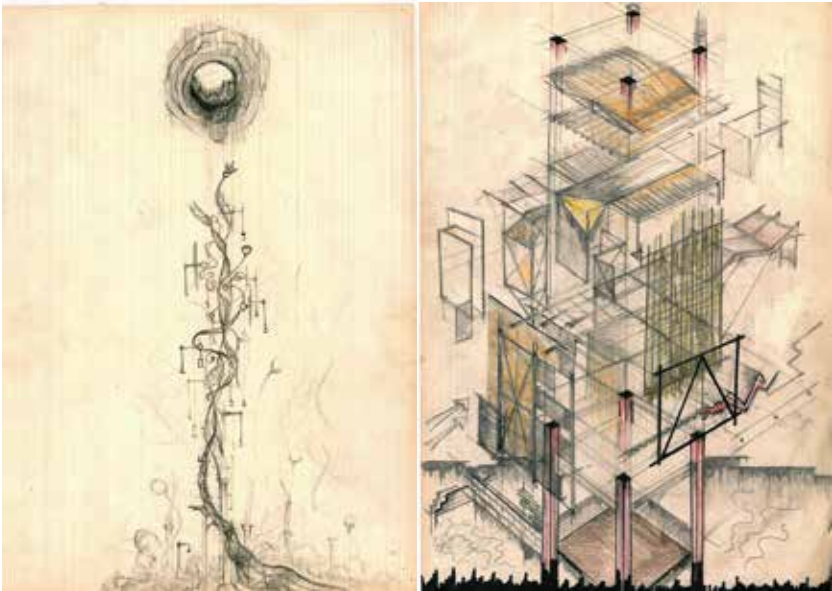


Mohmmad **Daniyal Tariq**

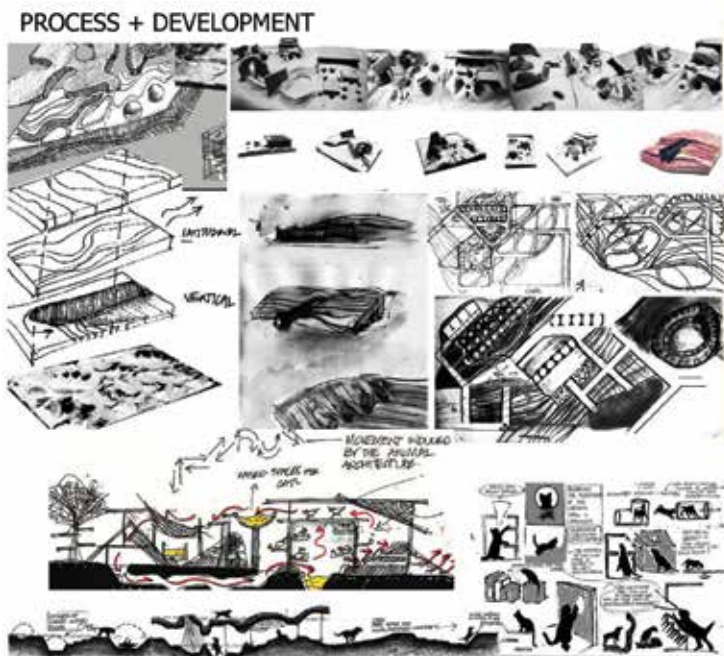




Rija Yousuf

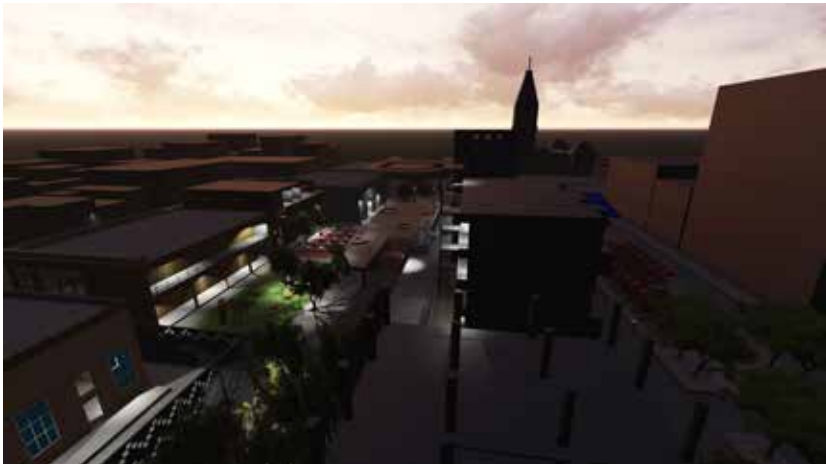

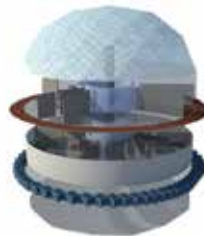

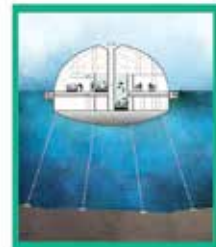
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Marine Research Centre, Mubarak Village

The stories are visualised and then displayed on the very current social media platform: Instagram, as a new means of storytelling, as well as to continue the evolution of printed platforms on to digital.

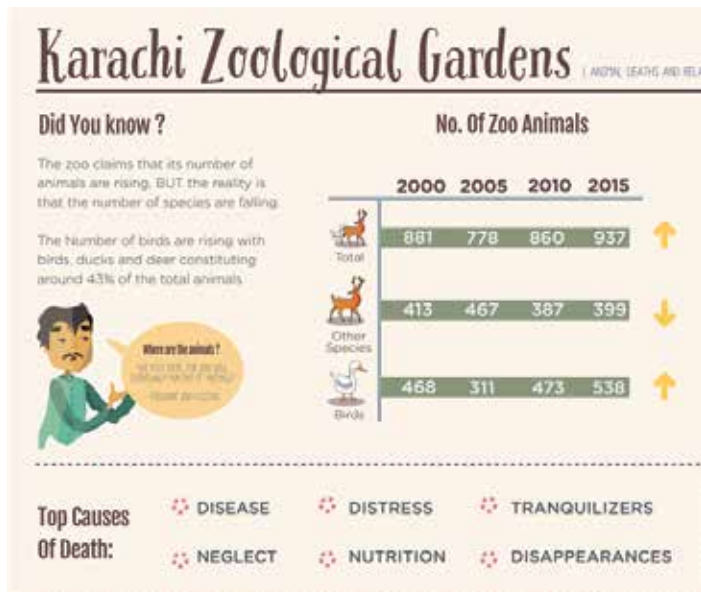

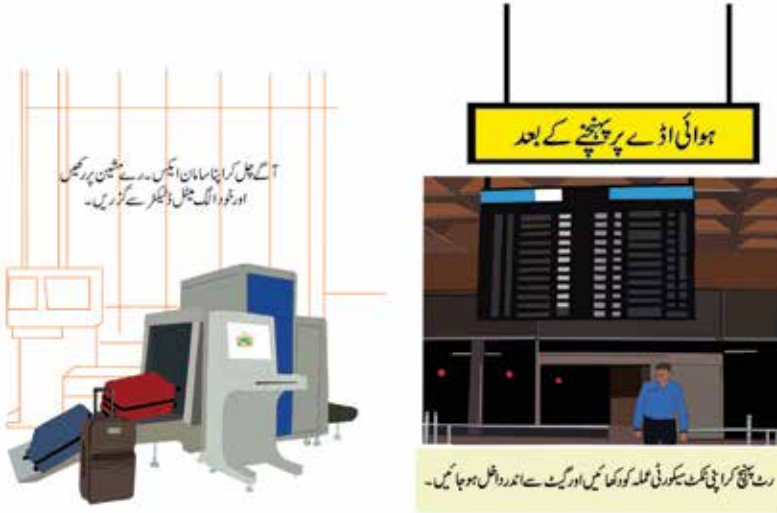

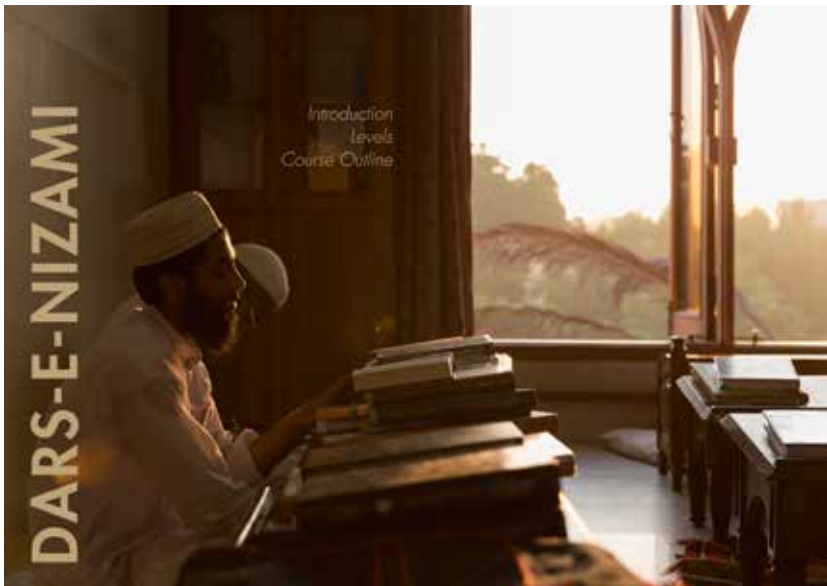




Zoral Khurram Naik

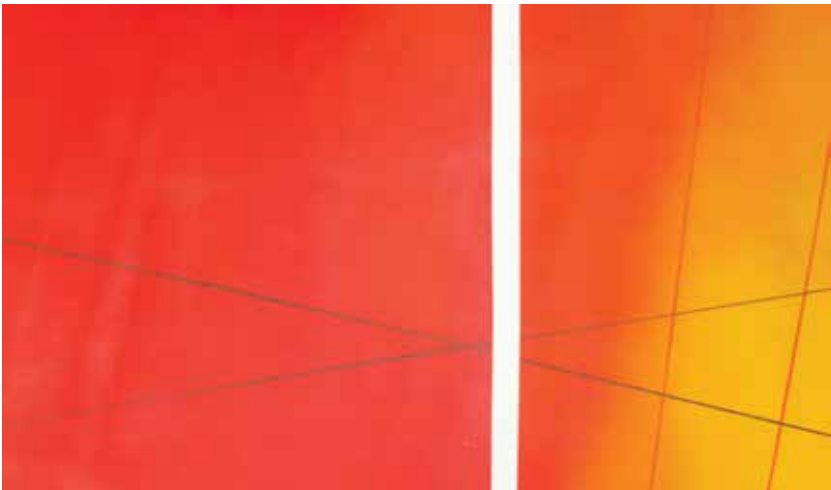




Maliha Saleem

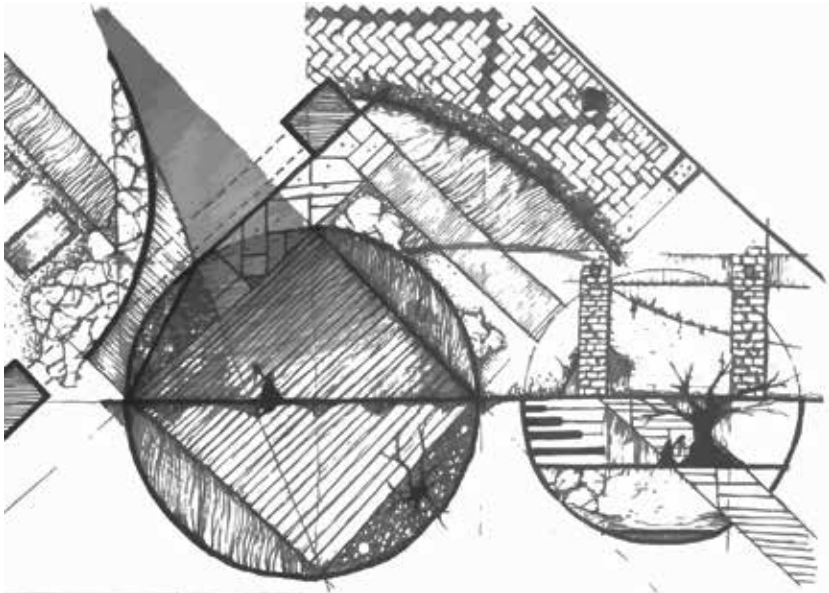




Farhan Feroz Ali

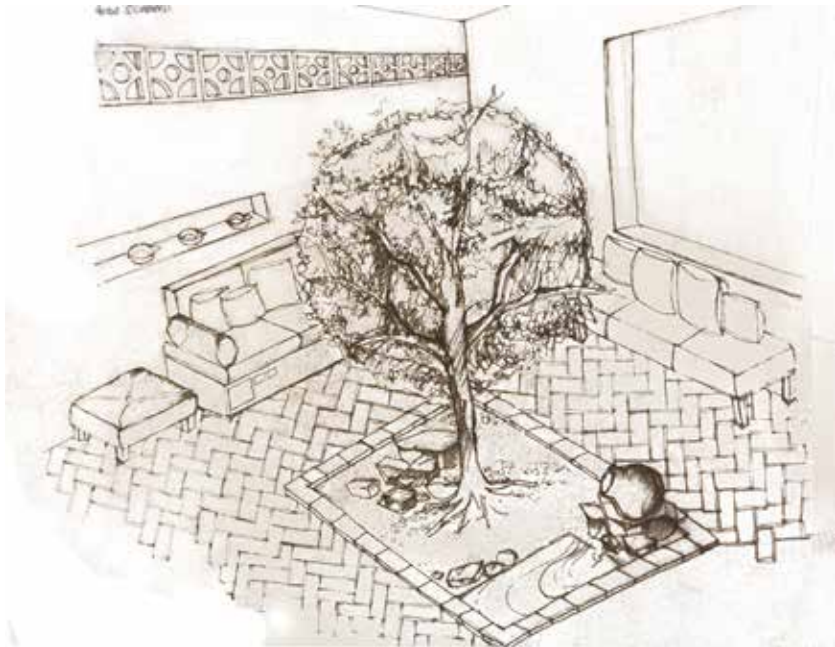

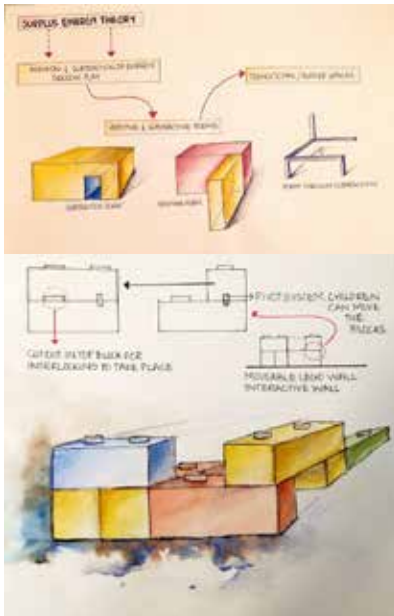


Sarah Tanveer Ahmed

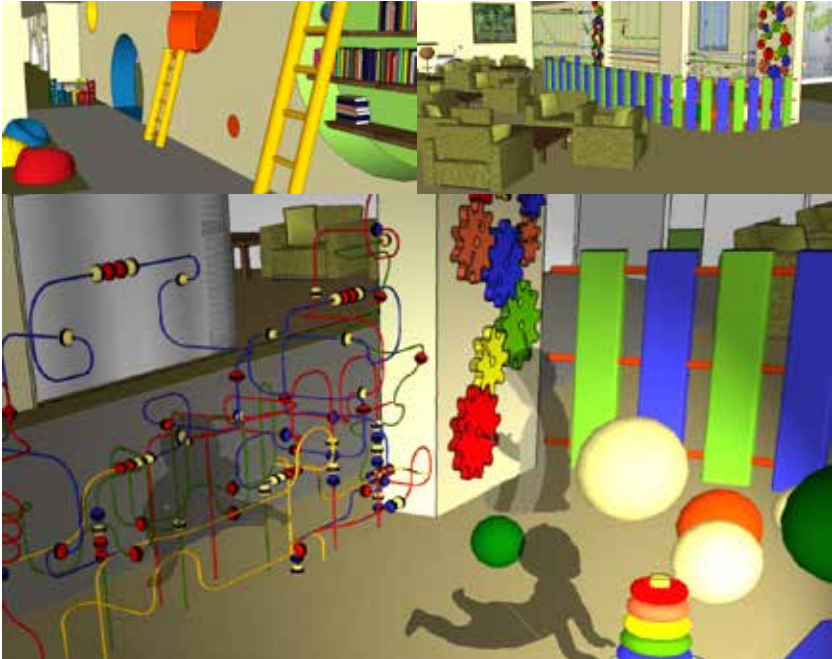

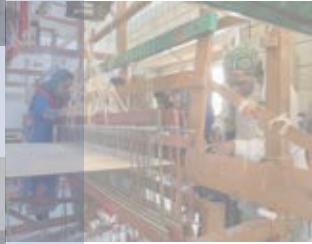
Healing is Fun - Playful Hospital Environment

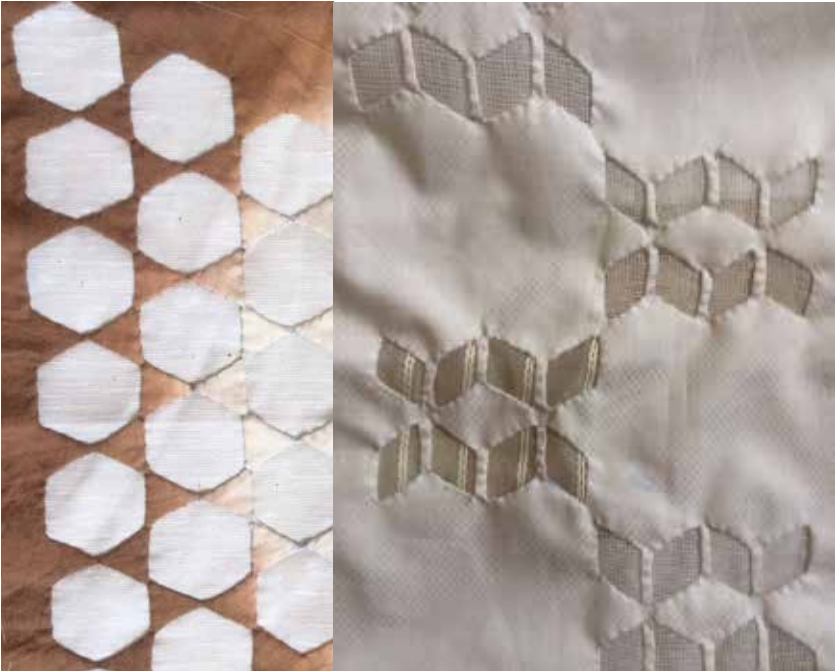




Maria Khan

The stitches I chose are Jali tanka (also known as Bajrey ki jali), French knots and Satin stitch. The reason why I chose these particularly is because when they are used together they give a relief effect as Jali tanka is a flat stitch as compared to the other two stitches.

I have made borders and buttons in different designs and sizes. I have used pure material like Karandi and Khadar. My colours come from Parrots. The reason why I have chosen this specific bird is because there are beautiful colours and shades in each and every parrot which will help me make interesting colour combinations. I have worked with a cluster of craftsperson at Shirijinah Colony.

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Translating Corn into Apparel

For my thesis project, I have worked with an inspiration through which I could incorporate the different textile techniques learnt into apparel. My collection is inspired from a corn. My project included a lot of market research on the kinds of fabric and a lot of draping. I took sand dunes as my source and replicated the lines in the form of drapes. Prints were also included and the source for that was reptiles found in the desert.

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Dhurrie

Dhurrie is a flat hand-woven rug, traditionally used in the sub-continent as floor coverings. With time, the concept of hand-woven dhurrie is becoming obsolete. My thesis is on the revival of dhurrie, using multiple techniques of fabric construction on the hand loom. I have designed contemporary cotton dhurrie, suitable as a floor covering.
